PREFACE

This Second Edition of the AMERICAN ARCHITECTS DIRECTORY, first published six years ago to fill a long felt need for an authoritative and reasonably comprehensive reference volume on living American architects, represents an increase of about forty per cent in listings and over fifty per cent in biographical sketches. In addition it offers several new features which enhance its usefulness to members of the architectural profession as well as its reference value to organizations and institutions needing such information, government officials, librarians and the general public.

Briefly, the new features of the Second Edition of the Directory are (1) in print for the first time "Officers and Conventions, The American Institute of Architects," from its founding in 1857; (2) Architectural Firm Listings, identifying all single principal and multi-principal firms listed together in the Biographical Index by a symbol and giving the names of partners or principals of multi-principal firms with addresses cross-indexed in the Geographical Index; (3) a two-line format providing complete information at the beginning of each biography concerning the architect's relationships with The Institute in the first line, and in the second, the name of his firm and business address; (4) a footnote at the bottom of each page of the Biographical Index providing a key to General Types of Work Executed listed by numbers in all biographical sketches and (5) a Necrology of A.I.A. member biographees from the first edition. An additional feature is the roster of members of The Producers' Council, Inc., affiliate of The Institute, in the Appendix.

Omitted from this 1962 Edition are (a) the section on Chapters of The Institute listing Chapter Officers, which information is published in Committee Structure and National and Chapter Officers of The American Institute of Architects in Parts I and II and distributed twice annually to all corporate members; (b) the section on Miscellaneous Awards listing the annual awards of The Producers' Council and The A.I.A.

in Building Products Literature Competitions, of special interest to manufacturers of building materials and equipment; (c) Publications and Documents from The A.I.A. catalogs including the latest revisions of contract documents and legal forms being available on request from Headquarters in Washington, D.C.; and (d) the Selected List of Journals on Architecture, a list subject to constant change and extension as new publications record the progress of architecture throughout the world.

Scope

Published under the sponsorship and with the cooperation of The American Institute of Architects, every effort has been made to include and accurately list every corporate member. With the approval of The Institute, requests for the omission of names of a few members have been respected. Other architects, established in practice and of good repute from whom biographical details have been obtained, are included together with those non-member biographees of the 1956 edition who have returned revised entries to the publishers. Biographies which have been up-dated by the editor for lack of new information and two-line entries for A.I.A. members who have not replied to requests for biographical data either for the first or this edition, are marked by an asterisk. Two-line entries, without an asterisk, have been included for those new members of The Institute who have joined too late to obtain biographical entries. Since inclusion in the Directory is one of the privileges of A.I.A. membership, biographies of some former members are regretfully missing as are those of nonmembers who have not replied to our request for information. Requests for questionnaires by non-members have been honored and their biographies included when their eligibility has been established. Architectural Firm Listings are integrated with biographical sketches in the Biographical Index. Single principal firms are identified by the Firm Symbol (†) before the name of the firm on the second line of the

biographical sketch of the principal. Multi-principal firms are listed separately with dagger to provide for listings of partners and principals.

Following recommendations of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors of The Institute, names of architectural firms must include the name of an architect to be eligible for listing. With few exceptions, in which the architectural character of the firm's work is unquestioned in the judgment of the editor, this rule has been strictly followed. Further, descriptive material usually following the names of firms such as "Architect," "Architects and Planners," "Architects & Engineers," etc., has been omitted from all firm names, the legal title being included under the heading "Present Firm." Where partners or principals in a firm are other than architects, professions of such other principals are identified by the abbreviated symbol of the profession such as "C. E." (if a civil engineer). Since this volume is devoted to architects, no symbols such as RA or letters indicating membership in any professional society are used for architects or architectengineers. Multi-principal firms, with descriptive connotations such as "Architects and Engineers," are listed when it is evident to the editor that the principal work of the firm is architectural whatever the professions of partners or principals; such firms with names followed by connotations indicating that the principal work of the firm is engineering, even though the firm may be acting as "Architects and Engineers" on important architectural projects, have been deemed ineligible for inclusion under "Architectural Firm Listings."

Criteria

Since the substantial increase in the number of biographees, together with the inclusion of architectural firm listings, would naturally result in a corresponding increase in the size and cost of the volume, it was decided to limit biographical data in this edition of necessity to those categories believed to be pertinent to the practice of most architects. Therefore, while emphasizing the professional content of biographies, it has been deemed expedient to omit such items as marriages, number of children, pre-professional educational institutions unless such education has been considered an integral part of professional training; foreign countries visited and memberships in fraternal, political, religious, social and professional organizations. Unless included under the category of Principal Works, listings of the serv-

ices of the Supervising and Consulting Architect have been omitted. Listings under Honor Awards have been generally limited (applying to a small number of biographees) to those awards received since the publication of the 1956 edition of the Directory. In biographies affected by this ruling, reference is made to such previous listings. A complete list of First Honor Awards and Awards of Merit of the AIA Honor Awards for Current Work program, from its establishment in 1949 through 1962, appears in the front matter of this book. The recording of AIA activities covers official positions held in chapter, state and regional organizations of The Institute and to memberships and chairmanships of Institute committees, regional directorships and Officers of The Institute.

On the first line of biographies, full names of members are followed by the symbol "AIA" and the year of joining indicated by the last two decimals of the year, i.e., "56"; if a Fellow also, "FAIA" and the year of advancement. Emeritus or Life Member status is indicated by "E" and "Life Mem." respectively. The name of the Chapter with which the architect is officially affiliated completes the first line. The second line starts with the Firm Symbol(†) when the biographee is the principal of a single principal firm. Its absence indicates that the architect is not a principal or that he is a partner or legal principal of a multi-principal firm, the name of which is the first item in this line and which will be found, with the dagger, alphabetically listed. Multi-principal firm listings start with the Firm Name, followed by address or addresses and the names of partners or legal principals.

Items of information follow the same order in all biographies: place and date of birth, education above secondary school level with scholastic honors won and scholarships or fellowships awarded by the institutions attended; positions held as an employee, and previous partnerships or positions held as a principal; the name of the present firm in which the biographee is either a principal or employee and, if not an architectural firm, the occupation and position held in such organization. Then follows a list of states in which the architect is presently registered to practice, and National Council of Architectural Registration Board certificate (NCARB) if so registered. A series of numbers, cross-indexed to keys at the bottom of each page and, in more detail, at the beginning of the Biographical Index, indicate types of work previously executed; then, examples

of the architect's principal works completed through 1961; honorary degrees or honors awarded by the AIA or its Chapters, architectural publications, magazines and various civic or governmental organizations including competition awards since the publication of the 1956 edition of the Directory. Then follow: educational activities and positions held in professional schools of architecture or other institutions, as administrators, or teachers on various academic levels from instructor to professor or as occasional lecturer; past and present service on public commissions or committees; past military or civilian service in federal, state, city or foreign governments; books published as author, co-author, editor, contributor, illustrator or translator; honorary memberships in domestic or foreign academies or societies; and finally, A.I.A. activities as a Chapter or State Association officer, memberships and chairmanships of Institute Committees, Regional Directorships and offices held in The Institute.

Under the category of Principal Works, ethical as well as legal aspects of such listings have dictated strict adherence to the rule in this edition that the Architect of Record, only, be granted this privilege and limited, therefore, to The Architect of a single practitioner firm or to partners or legal principals of multi-principal firms. Architects employed by local, state, or federal government, or by institutions, in which they have been completely responsible for the design and supervision of construction of buildings or projects in their departments, have been eligible to list such projects as the "Architect of Record."

Principal works and correlated general types of work previously executed while in independent practice, though presently employed and ineligible for a firm listing, are included in the biographies of such architects when the years of such independent practice have been indicated in questionnaires.

Conclusion

Every effort has been made by the publishers and editor to assure the accuracy and completeness of this volume. Of the total of approximately 11,200 full biographies, some 9,400 architects have submitted new questionnaires or revised previous entries have been up-dated by the editor. About 4,000 AIA members, who did not submit biographical data for either the first or second editions, have two-line entries, identified by an asterisk, in order that the roster of AIA members will be sufficiently complete

to serve as a membership list. Newly elected members, of whom there are some 200 from whom biographies could not be obtained in time for publication, also have two-line entries, without an asterisk bringing the grand total to approximately 15,400 architects. Newly elected Fellows of The Institute, class of 1962, whose induction will occur about the time this edition is released, are included in the roll of The College of Fellows in the front matter of this volume.

In spite of our efforts to obtain complete data on architectural firms which number some 6,500, the names of some principals are missing. The accuracy and completeness of such listings as well as of biographical data are the responsibility of the principals concerned and of biographees. The publisher has used its best effort to include material submitted but has no legal responsibility for accidental omissions or The editor has endeavored to include all material eligible under criteria established for this edition as presented on questionnaires, and to avoid errors in the up-dating of previous entries. He has used his best judgment in decisions concerning the inclusion of multi-principal firms when the services rendered include both those of the architect and engineer. For inadvertent errors he asks the understanding indulgence of biographees and of the profession.
