The nominee has directed his committee to play a more active role in housing affairs. This included the writing of an A.I.A. policy statement on housing, in which he, along with Mr. George Kassabaum, testified before the Senate Banking and Finance Committee on the proposed housing bill, and with George Rockrise, testified before the House Committee on the same bill. Mr. Cohen also met with Congressman Reuss and Congressman Ashley of Ohio pertaining to modifying the wording of the Public Housing Law's negative statement on design. The A.I.A.'s proposal was incorporated into the legal history. He was instrumental in developing closer liaison with the National Association of Homebuilders. During the 1964 St. Louis convention, Mr. Cohen spoke at the Workshop seminar on housing.

2. Describe the specific achievements of the nominee which have contributed notably to the advancement of the profession in the field of public service by his service listed above:

The nominee, to make the community more aware of the shortcomings of suburbia in terms of planning, organized the Design Committee of Silver Spring. This Committee which was part of the A.I.A. Chapter, developed a proposed plan of the commercial area of Silver Spring and developed sketches that indicated how the selection of street furniture, pedestrian ways, sign control and better administration of zoning ordinances could result in a better environment. To publize his committee's work, the nominee spoke and presented a slide talk which he developed to many civic groups in the County. From the work of the committee, a presentation was developed on specific proposals to the local government of how to effectively bring the proposals to reality. The local government has not enacted ordinances incurred by this A.I.A. effort. The nominee also served as Potomac Valley Chapter liaison with the Virginia Polytechnical Institute when their School of Planning made a study problem of the plan. In this connection, he lectured at V.P.I.
