Military Service:

1941-45: Washington, D.C. Assistant to officer-in-charge of Air Base Facilities Section, DCNO(Air). Overall planning of Naval Air Base requirements in Continental United States; recommendations on new building construction; periodic inspection of Continental air bases and recommendations for the expansion or roll up of facilities.

1945-46: Pearl Harbor, T.H. Officer-in-charge of Base and Mobile Equipment Section, Staff of Commander Air Force, Pacific Fleet. Supervised work involving modification of assemblies of advanced air base equipment for establishment of new bases and expansion of existing bases. Periodic trips to forward areas to determine detailed requirements.

1940-41: Prior to entering military service, the nominee was employed by architects Harold J. Bissner and Whitney R. Smith, both of Pasadena, California. In their offices the nominee prepared preliminary designs, presentation drawings and working drawings for residential and commercial buildings. He was also employed, for six months, by the F. C. Stolte Company, general contractors, Alameda, California. The nominee was in complete charge of the interpretation of plans and specifications on large building projects for Army camps and housing projects. He prepared all necessary additional drawings such as the framing diagrams, plumbing layouts, etc.

With Charles M. Goodman Associates: Preparation of preliminary designs and presentation sketches, production of all working drawings and supervision of construction for housing, first section at Hollin Hills, Virginia; Master plan for The American University, Washington, D.C., and the United States Embassy at Reykjavik, Iceland.

With Keyes, Smith, Satterlee & Lethbridge: Design and presentation work, in charge of working drawing production and site work for housing and apartment buildings (Westover Apartments, Arlington, Virginia); redevelopment of part of Southwest Washington, D.C.; United States Embassy, Asuncion, Paraguay; the "Weathermaker Home Competition" first prize house (with Nicholas Satterlee, AIA, and Francis D. Lethbridge, FAIA).

2. Describe nominee's notable work in design, to bring out the particular achievements the nominators believe have notably contributed to the advancement of the profession.

The nominee's work in contemporary design is noteworthy, having been recognized in the profession by design awards and outside the profession by publication in various periodicals. The nominee's success in these efforts had an enlightening effect on the community in general, and has encouraged others to work toward the same objectives.

The nominee's approach to urban planning and design is strongly expressed in the two Redevelopment Land Agency design competition winners in Southwest Washington, Tiber Island and Carrollsburg Square. The town houses, high-rise apartments and underground garages have been developed to form a system of enclosed spaces, large public plazas, intimate public residential courts and private walled gardens and patios. Tiber Island received an AIA First Honor Award in 1966.

Administration Building No. 31 was designed for the Office of Public Buildings, and was planned to be built in two separate stages. These two towers are connected by the public areas, including a two-story cafeteria wing. Behind the cafeteria and visible from it, is a landscaped terrace. A 230,000 square foot extension to this building has just been designed.

The Cedar Lane Unitarian Church was commented on as follows by the Special Awards issue (June, 1960) of the Potomac Valley Architect:

"We admire the organization of the plan and the provisions made for future expansion. The use and beauty of materials, the masterful handling of a rather complicated roof structure is outstanding. The design details of windows, walls and the chancel screen are certainly commendable and deserving of an award."

The nominee's versatility as a designer is illustrated further by his simple, small homes; of which an example is one designed for Mrs. Charles Tobey, the owner of a fine collection of Early Americana. Situated on a large estate, the house features a trellised terrace overlooking a handsome meadow and a small enclosed garden court with a fountain. Other notable residences designed by the nominee include the Stadtman house in Montgomery County, Maryland; the Michael Straight house in Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts; and his own recently completed home in Chevy Chase, Maryland.

Particularly apparent in all of the nominee's design work is a sensitive response to the inherent possibilities of the site as well as to the building program. Another characteristic aspect of his work is the meticulous care with which he carries through the detailing of every related part of the design, whether it be an urban project of great scope, or an intimately scaled example of residential design. The nominee is one who develops his work personally, a designer who is also a superb architectural draftsman and delineator, and who has exercised great influence on those talented younger architects who have worked under his guidance.

WASHINGTON D. C., April 23 -- Three Washingtonians are among 82 architects in the nation advanced to Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects. The AIA announced 1967 recipients of the lifetime honor today.

The three, whose offices are in the District of Columbia, are David H. Condon of 6805 Georgia Street, Chevy Chase, Md.; Nicholas Satterlee of 3021 Que Street, N.W., Washington D. C.; and J. Rowland Snyder of 1840 47th Place N.W., Washington D. C.

Aside from the Gold Medal, which may be presented to a single architect from any part of the world, Fellowship is the highest honor the Institute can bestow on its members. The 82 new Fellows bring the number of Institute members using the letters FAIA after their names to 762. There are now 25 architects from the Washington metropolitan area who hold this distinction.

Investiture of the new Fellows will take place at the annual banquet and ball Thursday, May 18, climaxing the 99th annual convention of the Lastitute to be held in New York City beginning May 14.

Condon and Satterlee were elevated to Fellowship for distinguished contribution to the profession through design, and Snyder for his service to the profession.

David H. Condon, 51, a partner in the firm of Keyes, Lethbridge & Condon, is a native of California. He received his A.B. in Architecture from the University of California.

Notable designs for which he is responsible include the award-winning Tiber Island Apartment and Carrollsburg Square in Washington, the
Cedar Lane Unitarian Church and the Administration Building #31 at the
National Institutes of Health in Bethesda and the YMCA in Frederick, ad.
Tiber Island received an AIA First Honor Award in 1966.

His versality as a designer is illustrated further by his simple homes, including his own in Chevy Chase.

A member of AIA since 1956, he has served as a member of various committees, including Chairman of the Exhibitions Committee which produced numerous exhibits at the Octagon Gallery. He has also served on juries for school competitions and as a visiting critic for the School of Architecture at Catholic University.

Nicholas Satterlee, 51, is principal in the firm of Nicholas Satteriee & Associates. Born in Rochester, N.Y., he is a graduate of the Hotchkiss School in Connecticut, of Harvard College and Harvard Graduate School of Design, from which he received his Bachelor of Architecture degree in 1941.

Outstanding examples of his designs include the Holmes Run Development Houses in Fairfax County, Va., and the AIA Merit Award-winning Capital Park Apartments, Section I, which is part of the Southwest urban redevelopment complex. Other designs include Temple Sinai on Military Road, N.W., Capital Park Apartments, Section II, and the remodeling of an old town house into a gallery for The Washington Gallery of Modern Art.

Satterlee has been active in the field of education, lecturing at The George Washington University, Catholic University, The University of Virginia and Virginia Polytechnic Institute. A member of AIA since

1949 he has served on various committees on the national and local level for the Institute in urban designing, community planning and zening problems.

J. Rowland Snyder, 64, is the director, Architectural Division, Public Buildings Service for the General Services Administration.

A native of Bangor, Pa., Snyder received his bachelor and master's degrees in architecture from the University of Pennsylvania. Before entering government service in 1958, he was involved in private practice. This work included the remodelling of the AIA's Octagon Library. Snyder became a member of AIA in 1947.

As the director of architectural design, Snyder is charged with the responsibility for directing and controlling all architectural and structural engineering activities relating to a nation-wide building program.

1.1962, he was honored with the Outstanding Rating Award from GSA for his great contributions to the design program of the Public Building Service.

Award-Winning Architect David H. Condon Dies at 80

David H. Condon, 80, an architect who helped introduce modern building design to the Washington area after World War II and whose work included Tiber Island, Carrollsburg Square, the Washington Design Center and the Carderock Springs and Hollin Hills subdivisions, died of cancer July 14 at his home in Chevy Chase.

A partner for 36 years in the leading Washington firm of Keys Condon & Florence and its predecessor, Mr. Condon designed the central administration building at the National Institutes of Health and major buildings on the campuses of American, Catholic and George Washington universities and the University of Maryland. He did renovations at the west wing of the National Gallery of Art, the Pension Building and the Cosmos Club.

Mr. Condon was a native of Pasadena, Calif., and a graduate of the University of California at Berkeley. He served in the Navy in the Pacific during World War II.

He began working as an architect in Washington after the war, a fertile time for young designers. Postwar suburban development was being fueled by veterans housing benefits, and there was a large backlog of residential and commercial building ready to be planned.

Washington Post critic Benjamin Forgey wrote in 1992 that Mr. Condon and his future partners had, in their studies during the Depression, "imbibed an impatience with things as they were and a desire to create something untainted by the past. Af-

something untainted by the past. Atter the war, like many in their generation, they were anxious to put their enthusiasms to work for like-minded clients, builders and designers."

Mr. Condon first joined Washington architect Charles Goodman in designing Hollin Hills, south of Alexandria, the area's first modern suburban subdivision. The houses, in contrast to Washington's many Colonial-style detached houses and grassy yards, were set in the woods and had flat roofs and floor-to-ceiling windows.

Mr. Condon left Goodman in 1952 to join the firm that, four years later, became Keys Lethbridge & Condon. The partners worked largely on subdivision projects, ultimately designing nearly 2,500 houses for private developers. In turning down commissions for more traditional designs, the firm soon was leading the field in modern residential architecture here.

The experience of Mr. Condon's firm with large-scale housing developments positioned it to take advantage of changes in the local market, Forgey wrote, and it moved to major urban-renewal projects in the 1960s and big commercial buildings in the 1980s.

Mr. Condon left his mark in particular on Southwest Washington, where his Tiber Island and Carrollsburg Square projects were "handsome, adroitly composed combinations of row houses, massive apartment buildings and open spaces," Forgey wrote.

The year Mr. Condon retired, the local chapter of the American Institute of Architects gave him its highest honor, the Centennial Award, in recognition of "the brilliance and diversity of his award-winning buildings and his contribution as a mentor to succeeding generations of Washington architects."

He was a fellow of the American Institute of Architects and a member of the Cosmos Club, the D.C. architectural licensing board and a national panel of consultants for what was then the Public Housing Administration.

Survivors include his wife of 50 years, Sylvia E. Condon of Chevy Chase; two children, Michael D. Condon of Ashton and Ann M. Diven of Silver Spring; a brother, Tom Condon of Monterey, Calif.; a sister, Judith Condon of Corona Del Mar, Calif.; and two grandchildren.
