Therefore as an educator who has performed a distinguished service to the profession he deserves consideration.

Above and beyond that, however, the architectural work for which he has been responsible through many years has been of outstanding quality. His abilities are attested to by the completion here of the Municipal Opera colonnade and the World War II Memorial, both of which were wom in competition, and a succession of distinguished churches, schools, residences and other buildings which provide a fresh note on the contemporary scene. His firm also won recently the competition for the new Washington University Library with a distinguished design which for tact as relating to the existing campus, and for brilliant planning, received the acclaim of the jury of award.

Though I am only a corporate member of the Institute and am no longer in practice myself, I should like as a client to attest to Mr. Murphy's abilities since his firm of Murphy and Mackey is responsible for the new work, both executed and planned, for this museum of which I am Director.

In the delicate matter of weighing and recognizing a client's needs, conscientiously budgeting expenses against available funds, and, perhaps most of all, setting a standard of planning and design that provides contemporary character and at the same time respects and even enhances the existing building, Mr. Murphy could not well be surpassed.

As our existing museum building is one of the distinguished works of the late Cass Gilbert and belongs to the City of St. Louis, this quality has been of the utmost importance in securing the approval both of our Trustees, of the city officials and as well of the public generally.

It gives me much pleasure to submit this letter supporting the nomination of Joseph D. Murphy to the high honor of Fellowship in the American Institute of Architects.

An association with the nominee is a real inspiration. It is impossible to be in his company, either as a friend or as a student, without being stimulated by his high ideals and abilities in the field of design and his ability to convey his wisdom to others.

As instructor and head of the School of Architecture, Washington University in St. Louis, he was in a position to influence many young men. His was a gift to inspire those men with a feeling for function and aesthetics. The school assumed a new character under his leadership as Acting Dean, 1948 and 1949, and as Dean 1949-1952. Gentlemen:

Joseph D. Murphy is one of those rare and unusual personalities to appear occasionally among the human race, whose stature as a man so supplements his remarkable design capacity that he has raised the profession of architecture to a position of even greater trust and respect. His own dedications and sincerety are so conspicuous that he has even managed to make a dent in the tightly knit hierarchy of the St. Louis archdiocese, where Murphy's steady and convincing discussions have resulted in a group of contemporary schools and churches of national significance, within an area once wedded to the Georgian and Jesuitical.

The aspirations of every architect in this region have been greatly aided by Murphy's conscientious and scrupulous talents. The high goals and progressive philosophy so indigenous to this gentle man permeate his accomplishments as educator, architect, advisor and citizen...and all who work within his aura soon find themselves strangely improved, slightly enlarged and possibly a hit ennobled by the contact.

Even beyond his own immediate field this appealing influence extends...touching contractors, consultants and clients, who inevitably think on a somewhat larger scale than they did before. This can be a painful process on occasion, but it's a liberal education to live in the same world as Joseph Dennis Murphy, and the privilege of working in a city where he is firmly established opens fields much greener than the drier pastures of unproselytised places.

This is no mere figure of speech. I have labored in the St. Louis vineyards for thirty years, and known Murphy for twenty of them. And I have personally witnessed an astonishing change within the University, the profession and even the governmental groups who run the town. I have heard the Honorable Raymond R. Tucker, who is now our Mayor but was then an engineer with a dubious attitude toward architects in general, say that "Joe Murphy is a man whose judgement I'd trust without even seeing his solution to a problem". That same Mayor recently took the startling step of applying to the local Chapter for screened lists of architects capable of working within the projected civic improvements on our St. Louis Multi-million dollar bond issue.

I have heard similar remarks from public relations people, leading citizens, and ordinary personalities who identify architecture with the highest ideals and principles....because Joe Murphy is an architect. And his complete generosity of spirit toward his fellow practitioners automatically raises other architects to such a position that minor jealousies become an impertinence.

His civic contributions are enormous. He so completely fulfills the responsibilities of an architect that the profession and the man blend into a truly inspirational total of increasingly wide-spread significance. As a frequent consultant of his on site planning and landscape architectural work, I often wish for the possibility of propagating Joe Murphy directly from finger joints or snips from the ear lobes. He's done very well with the usual propagating technique...but what the architectural profession needs is not just nine young people named Murphy. What we need are a lot more of the original Joes.

Therefore, it gives me the greatest of pleasure to give my unqualified endorsement to the Nomination of Joseph Dennis Murphy, A.I.A. for advancement to Fellowship in the American Institute of Architects.
