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I am well acquainted with the architectural program at the University of Idaho and in recent years I have had the opportunity to lecture and become intimately acquainted with many of Mr. Prichard's architectural students. The University of Idaho Architectural school is not large by comparison, nor is it conveniently located or adequately housed and financed. The community, aside from the University, does not provide a great amount of stimulus. Yet, Mr. Prichard has somehow (and many times almost singlehandledly) produced mature graduates to equal most any west coast university. Mr. Prichard's greatest contribution to his students is stimulus. Early in their architectural education his students receive that intangible quality which dedicates them to the practice of architecture. The records of his students speak for the quality of accomplishment, both on their behalf and Mr. Prichards. In recommending Dr. Theodore J. Prichard to Fellowship in the American Institute of Architects, I wish to emphasize his candidacy with respect to three major points. First, Professor Prichard is a man of great stature. He has charm. He has a deep intellectual background, and he is a man of great integrity and sound judgement. He towers above the giants on many campuses. He exercises a wisdom which he achieved through strict intellectual discipline and experience.

Second, he is an unusual architect, both as a practitioner and as a teacher. He has given most of his career to teaching, but had time permitted, I am fully convinced that he would have been one of Americas great creative architects. In 1926 the Department of Art & Architecture had an enrollment of 20 Art Majors and 15 Architectural Majors. In 1962-1963 the total enrollment of the University was 4700 students; in the same year the Department of Art & Architecture enrollment was 800, with 119 Architectural Majors.

Professor Prichard became head of the Architectural section of the Department in 1929 and head of the Department in 1944. He has built a Department from one that had small recognition to one that has gained wide recognition throughout the entire West. This he has done against many odds, such as inadequate quarters, and inadequate salaries for his teaching staff. His Department has gained much in stature during the past fifteen years, and he has been able to increase the teaching staff to one that is adequate in ability and size. The Department will have a new building exclusively for its use within the next 18 months.

Architectural graduates of the Department are sought after by the leading offices in the Northwest each year.

Professor Prichard has taken every opportunity to increase his education during the years that he has been with the school, so as to better serve the school and its students.

He has gathered around him a staff of instructors dedicated to the teaching of architecture. His students admire him for his ability as a teacher and his devotion to the school. He has kept abreast of all that is best in architecture.

The graduates of this school have demonstrated that they understand the responsibilities of the Architect and a professional, and many have shown creative abilities requisite to contributive practice.

Graduates of this school are practicing Architects throughout the entire West, in Hawaii and Alaska, as well as other parts of the United States.
