CH h EX-HEAD OF LOCAL CHAPTER OIT: Refrigerating and Companies Until III Other Health Caused Retirement. CO Special to The New York Times. CARMEL, N. Y., May 15.—Lansing C. Holden, retired architect of New York City, died at his Summer home at Kenteliffs, near here, this morning after a month's illness of pneumonia. He was 72 years old. Because of failing health Mr. Holden came here ten years ago and built-Kentcliffs in the hope that a quiet, retired life would benefit him. He and Mrs. Holden had spent all their Summers here since then.

Funeral services will be held at St.

Bartholomew's Church, Park Avenue and Fifty-first Street, New
York, at 11 A. M. on Saturday. The
body will be cremated. D Mr. Holden was born in Rome, N. Y., in 1858, the son of William R. and Ann Elizabeth Davis Holden. After attending schools in Utica and Buffalo he attended Wooster University in Ohio, where he received an M. A. degree.

He began his practice as an architect early in life. He served on various committees of the American Institute of Architects and was largely responsible for the adoption of the institute's code of ethics in its present form. He was elected a fellow of the institute in 1912 and had been president of the New York Chapter. He had been a member of the Board of Examiners of the City of New York in 1916 and a member of the Board of Standards and Appeals from 1916 to 1918. He also had served as architect for the Lackawanna Railroad.

He was president of the Bronx Refrigerating Company from 1908 until this year. He also had been president of the Greater New York Cold Storage Company and president of the Tri-Boro Trucking Company. He was a director of the Engineers' Club and an honorary member of the Manhattanville Day Nursery.
