This will acknowledge with regret your letter of January 3rd.

A resignation must come to the Institute through the member's Chapter under the procedure shown on the marked excerpt sent herewith.

Until such resignation is received we must continue to carry you as an Institute member in good standing.

We are sorry you feel as you do, and that the Ethics of the Institute are of so little force.

Surely the great majority of the Institute members observe the Ethics, which are merely accepted rules of good sportsmanship, and surely you must have had some unfortunate experience.

If there are members whom you know who are intentionally violating the Code of Ethics it is your duty to send their names to the Institute, or to the President of the New Jersey Chapter.
