



Dear Mr. Kemper:

I feel that your very considerate letter of February 1st requires not only an acknowledgement but some sort of explanation from me as to the circumstances that are forcing me to withdraw from the Institute.

No one regrets more than I the present situation.

I was not among the fortunate architects who procured government work during this period of building restrictions. You will understand readily that that has meant hard sledding, coming, as it did, on top of the depression years.

Last summer, business started to improve with post-war work coming into the office. Just as I began to see my way out, the September hurricane hit Cape Cod; and my home was among those badly damaged. It is costing me many thousand dollars indebtedness to get it back into living condition.

With these obligations before me, you can see that I have no right to spend money outside necessity.

If it were just the matter of current dues, I could probably eke it out somehow; but the accumulation plus my indebtedness to the local chapter puts me entirely out of the running.

I write this not in the way of complaint, many are worse off than I, but so that you may understand that there has been no carelessness; but a great deal of regret.
