Thank you very much for your letter of July 24th about the status of my membership in the A. I. A.

I am returning herewith, duly filled out, my application for "Membership Emeritus".

My own architectural firm used to be in Chicago for many years until I closed it permanently in 1942 to enter the government. Since that time I have not practiced architecture for fees and live here at the above address in retirement.

During this time, since 1942, I have maintained my membership in the national institute and, when I moved here in 1948, I had my Chicago chapter membership transferred to the Maine chapter. I am, incidentally, a member of the Maine State Board of Architects (a registration and examining board), by appointment of the Governor of Maine.

The stationery on which I write would appear to indicate that I was in active practice. Such, however, is not the case. I am a Trustee and Executive Vice-President of the Knox County General Hospital at Rockland, Maine, and I am on the Board of a number of other local philanthropic and civic institutions. I do simple architectural work and render advisory services to these institutions gratis. In the execution of such work an architect's letterhead is necessary, particularly in the purchase of equipment. On such purchases I charge no fee. I have thus no income whatsoever from giving architectural advice or from any other similar source.

As an indication, the Internal Revenue Service states that I am not in business and refuses to allow me to make any deductions from my income tax return even for such expenses as an architectural magazine.

I would think, therefore, that I should be eligible for the "emeritus" classification.

The annual dues of our Maine Chapter are quite low and I would propose to continue them.
