

Many thanks for your letter of October 28th. Upon receipt of your letter, I made inquiries in Boston, and as I understand it now, the Boston Society of Architects is also the Boston chapter of A.I.A.

I wrote to the Boston Society of Architects cancelling my membership there because I have now moved my office to New York. I did not realize that such a cancellation as member in the Boston Society of Architects meant that, as in your letter, I am indebted for chapter dues in Boston for the year 1946.

For my own information, I would be very grateful to you if you would let me know first: does an A.I.A. member who pays fees to your Washington office automatically belong to the chapter of the place in which he works, or does he have to pay separate fees for this? Responding to yours of November 1st:

Every corporate member of The Institute must be assigned to a Chapter of The Institute, and is obligated to the chapter for dues as well as to The Institute.

Upon election to membership, every new member is advised that he is assigned to the chapter where he has his legal residence or principal place of business, and is advised also, that he will remain a member of that chapter until such membership is terminated by resignation, transfer, etc.

The Boston Chapter of the A.I.A. also calls itself the Boston Society of Architects, and you should have received statements for dues from the chapter in spite of your removal from the city, as there was no change in your chapter assignment.

Gustomarily, members are not transferred from one chapter to another unless a request for such transfer is received, but their names must be carried on the chapter's rolls unless their status is changed by direction of The Institute headquarters in Washington.

The New York Chapter - and all chapters - operate in a similar manner under standard procedure. The Ghapter has an office at 115 East 40th Street, New York City, where it maintains a staff to care for chapter matters. As all other chapters do, it acts for and represents The Institute within its territory.

Any affiliation which the Chapter may have with the Architectural League of New York, therefore, would have no bearing on membership in The Institute and the New York Chapter of The Institute.
