BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH

Born in Chicago, my family moved to Evanston when I was six years old. I attended the grade schools and township high school for two years; then one year at Northwestern Academy preparing for Sheffield Scientific School of Yale University, which I entered in the fall of 1894, but only attended one year. At that time I decided to be an architect and transferred to the sophomore class at Massachusetts Institute of Technology in the fall of 1895 and graduated from there in 1898. Was a member of Phi Beta Epsilon Fraternity and associated with various activities of the school. My early training and office experience was first with Holabird and Roche, then the Board of Education of Chicago, and three years in LosAngeles with John Parkinson. In 1905 became associated with the firm of Marshall and Fox of Chicago, where I remained for ten years, having charge of the drafting room and more directly doing all their planning and designing. Some of the principal examples of this period are the Blackstone Hotel, Chicago; Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Building of Milwaukee; Burlington Office Building, Chicago; and the Maxine Elliott Theatre of New York, etc. In 1915 I opened my own office under the present name, thus having been practicing independently for about fifteen years, except for about a year in 1918 and 1919 when I served as Captain in the Construction Division of the Army, closing my office and starting afresh in 1919. Since that time I have been very busily occupied specializing particularly in large apartment buildings and hotels, having designed and finished twenty to thirty buildings of the above class, practically all being successfully operated. This work was done with a comparatively small organization and has kept me personally very busy with direct control of all planning, designing, and other duties in the office.

As to personal life, was married to Eleanor Harris in 1911. Traveled rather extensively in this country, and in Europe in 1914.

Club memberships are - Union League, Cliff Dwellers, The Tavern, Evanston Club, University Club of Evanston, Westmoreland and Indian Hill Country Clubs.

BY-LAW PROVISIONS AND RULES OF PROCEDURE CONCERNING ADVANCEMENT TO FELLOWSHIP.

Address communications to The Chairman, The Jury of Fellows The Octagon, Washington, D. C.

By-Laws of the Institute.

Art. II, Section 1. General Conditions of Fellowship.

Fellowship in The American Institute of Architects is conferred upon a Member who is a citizen of the United States who, in the opinion of an authorized Jury of Fellows, shall have notably contributed to the advancement of the Profession in design, construction, literature, education or public service.

Membership in the Institute for not less than ten years shall

be a prerequisite to Fellowship.

The Jury of Fellows shall consist of six Fellows appointed by the President, two of whom shall serve for periods of one, two, and three years, respectively, and until their successors are appointed. The President shall appoint the Chairman of the Jury, and shall fill all vacancies occurring in the Jury of Fellows by death, resignation, expiration of term or otherwise.

Any group of five or more Members may recommend to the Jury for consideration the name of a Member whom they deem qualified for Fellowship. Such recommendation shall contain a brief statement of the notable service or achievements which, in the opinion of the nominators, justify the nomination.

Names of nominees for Fellowship shall be submitted with full and explicit data to the Jury of Fellows on forms prepared for this purpose. The Jury shall then request from the Chapter Officials, the Directors of the Institute, and such other sources as it deems necessary privileged communications relating to the qualifications of the nominees. All recommendations shall remain on file with the Jury of Fellows for at least twelve months prior to final action, except that nominations filed before October 30, 1927, may be acted upon in season for the 1928 Convention.

The Jury shall formulate rules for its procedure subject to the approval of the Board of Directors.

SECTION 2. Mode of Election.

Election to Fellowship shall be by the Jury of Fellows. Fellows may be elected at any regular meeting of the Jury of Fellows.

Such election shall be by ballot. Four affirmative votes shall be necessary to elect.

The names of all Fellows so elected shall be announced to the Convention.

SECTION 3. Nomenclature.

Fellowship in the Institute shall be designated by the initials "F. A. I. A."

Rules of Procedure.

- 1. Meeting of the Jury of Fellows may be held at the call of the Chairman, subject to the approval of the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors.
- 2. Suggestions to the Jury for advancement to Fellowship may be made as stated in the By-laws.
- 3. The validity of any objection raised to any candidate shall rest solely with the Jury, and all communications shall be considered only as informative data.
- 4. The Jury shall file with the archives of the Institute the original recommendation and a statement of its action with the reasons for election in each case. Privileged communications shall not be preserved.
- 5. In the event of failure to act favorably upon any recommendation within three years due notice shall be given to the proponents, the recommendation surrendered and privileged communications destroyed. No recommendation so surrendered shall again be presented within two years from such notice.

This is a revised copy of the Rules of Procedure of the Jury of Fellows as amended and approved by the Board of Directors at its meeting on May 14, 1927.
