Mr. Hook's work in design has been outstanding for many years. Although trained in a traditional and conservative atmosphere, he has been a leader in this region in advancing new ideals in modern architecture. His work in design has been distinguished by careful study of proportion and mass, and he has attained excellent results with a minimum of ornamentation and "dressing up" of the exterior with unnecessary porticos, colonnades and other devices. At the same time, his design work has not degenerated into a slavish copying of "modern" cliches, but has retained form and mass pleasing to the discriminating eye.

His design work shows an unusual sympathy with the allied landscape and site planning professions, and he has frequently collaborated with those allied professions in the planning of parks, playgrounds and civic developments.

Mr. Hook's leadership of his profession in the Charlotte region has undoubtedly contributed greatly to the raising of architectural standards in that region.

Walter Hook's service to the Institute has been outstanding. He has been outstanding. He has been one time or another, all the elective offices possible in the Chapter, and would have been elected several more times except that his modesty caused him to decline the nomination.

He has been one of the mainstays of the Chapter since 1930.

Mr. Hook has attended at least 98% of all meetings and has taken a very active part in all the discussions and business of the Chapter. He has served on innumerable committees, and when so serving has invariably given freely of his time and energy to the project.

His work in connection with legislative matters has been particularly outstanding. His knowledge of the State's legislative machinery and his sinfluence with the various State officials has been of great assistance to the Chapter in all its dealings with the State agencies. His work in guiding to a successful enactment the revision of, and extensions to the against a successful enactment the revision of, and extensions to the against quite doubtful if these laws could have been passed without his work and influence in their behalf.

During the depression years when membership and interest in Chapter

During the depression years when membership and interest in Chapter affairs was at its lowest, and attendance at the meetings was sometimes only four or five, Mr. Hook's steady and consistent interest kept alive the feeble spark and gave the Chapter a firm foundation for its great expansion in the years following.

Walter Hook's service to the State and to his native city has been sclearly outstanding and has brought great recognition and honor to the sarchitectural profession.

In particular, his work in connection with the Building Code Council has been of an outstanding nature. Mr. Hook was one of the original proponents of a State Building Code, and he served for many years as a member and as chairman of this group. The Building Code was written and introduced in the North Carolina Legislature through the efforts of the Council, and safter numerous hardships and disappointments, was finally adopted as State Law. During this time, Mr. Hook gave freely of his time and energy, without even receiving travel or other expense money. Since then, he has served as Chairman of the Council, acting in an advisory capacity to the law. Hook has firmly and vigorously opposed the frequent attempts to circum-event or emasculate the law, frequently in opposition to the highest State conficials. His influence and record have been of tremendous value to the profession at such times. He has won the respect of all the State officials and many others by his honest and upright stands in protecting the Building and many others by his honest and upright stands in protecting the Building

Mr. Hook's service to the State and to his profession has also been great in connection with his work on the Board of Architectural Examination and Registration, of which he has been a member for eight years. The duties of this Board are to examine and license members of the profession in the State, and to enforce the laws regarding licensing, illegal practice, etc. As is usually the case, this job is an onerous one, requiring the holder to spend many days each year in conducting examinations, checking and correcting same, and also investigating and prosecuting illegal practitioners throughout the State.

Mr. Hook's service to his local community has been outstanding. He has served as a member and vice-chairman of the Board of Adjustment of the Zoning Commission. City of Charlotte, since its inception. This position requires him to sit in judgment concerning proposed violations of the zoning ordinance, and is one requiring considerable judgment and vision.

He is also President of the Mint Museum of Art, and was one of the chief proponents of this project, which consisted of acquiring the old Colonial Mint located in Charlotte, and setting it up as a municipal art museum. The difficulties inherent in this type of activity, particularly in a medium sized Southern city, are obvious. That it was carried through to a successful conclusion was, in great part, due to Mr. Hook's initiative and continuous effort.





In compliance with this new ruling the oldest architectural firm in the State of North Carolina changes its name from "Walter Hook Associates" to "The Freeman-White Associates."

In this area of the Country the name "HOOK" has been synonymous with architecture for the past 73 years. Mr. Charles C. Hook opened an office for the practice of architecture in Charlotte in 1889 and was at that time the only architect practicing in the State. In 1924, after alternately conducting an individual practice and sharing several partnerships, Charles C. Hook was joined by his son, Walter Williams Hook. This successful partnership was terminated with the passing of Charles Hook in 1938. The "Office of Walter Hook" flourished under that name until 1946, when the firm became a corporation, known as Walter Hook and Associates. In 1957 Mr. Hook and the Board of Directors effected still another name change; this time, to Walter Hook Associates", still a corporation. At Mr. Hook's death in September of 1963 he was succeeded as head of the firm by Beverly L. Freeman whose long experience as vice-president afforded a smooth transition at the time of such a loss.

Beverly L. Freeman and Hugh Edward White whose names have combined to become the new firm name have earned the distinction after many years of architectural practice with the firm in the Charlotte area; Mr. Freeman, eighteen years and Mr. White, twenty-one years. Both have held office in the Charlotte Section of the North Carolina Chapter of the American Institute of Architects and are active in Architectural and civic circles.
