



Dear Mr. Owen:

I have your letter of June 28 calling my attention to the fact that my Chapter dues are in arrears (a fact of which I am well aware) and stating, "Accordingly, our Executive Committee is recommending to the Institute that your membership be suspended". I also now have a notice of Impending Suspension of Membership from the Institute.

To say that I consider this a high-handed and insulting manner of handling this matter is putting it mildly. Apparently the current administration of the Chapter does not consider it desirable to give some warning of its actions, thus giving a delinquent member the opportunity of becoming current and avoiding the embarrassment of Institute notice, but instead takes the action first and then notifies the member. Please do not bother to quote the By-Laws to me in reply to this - I am very familiar with them.

I am also familiar with the policies of the Institute, having served for three years on the National Membership Committee, one year as Chairman. I, for one, am not embarrassed by your action because it now gives me the opportunity to express myself on an Institute policy which I consider to be wrong, under certain circumstances.

It is proper for the Institute to enforce the obligations to the Chapter, but only when these obligations are applied equally to all members. Under the dues structure adopted by the Virginia Chapter (based on number of employees) it is entirely possible for a Chapter with a majority of small offices to impose the bulk of its burden on a few large offices, and then have the Institute enforce this imposition by the threat of loss of Institute membership. This is taxation without representation, if I ever heard it! The Institute should modify its policy to enforcing Chapter dues only to the extent that a Corporate member be required to pay the same amount as any other Corporate member. A copy of this letter is going to the Institute, and I hope it will receive proper consideration.

Now, I will tell you why I have allowed my dues to lapse, and what I propose to do about it. I planned to attend the last Chapter meeting but illness prevented it. I expect to be at the next one because I think the Chapter has gone out of its mind, so to speak.

As the politicians say, let's look at the record. In 1954, my Chapter dues were \$10.00, in 1955, \$15.00. In 1956 the new policy was established, and I paid \$70.00. During these years, incidentally, those of us who felt we were benefitting from it also contributed to the Legislative Fund. In 1957 and again in 1958 I paid \$80.00. At that time the policy was construed to apply only to offices located in Virginia. Now you have not only doubled the amount, but want it paid also on branch offices, no matter where located. For 1959 my dues would be \$100.00 based on our Virginia office, and \$150.00 if we added the branch office. For 1960 they will be \$240.00 on the Virginia office and \$360.00 if we add the branch, and based on our current staff including the branch, next year I would pay \$440.00. In addition, the Virginia Chapter would receive \$40.00 each from two employed Corporate members and \$10.00 each from two Associates, for a total of \$540.00 from this office! It seems ridiculous on its face for the dues of any organization to increase by 50 times in 7 years without, I am sorry to observe, any apparent increase in services or benefits.

Referring again to your letter of June 28, you state that the Treasurer's records show that I am in arrears a minimum of \$20.00. This, of course, is based on the "no questions asked" policy, which policy, incidentally, I also consider childish and an insult to the intelligence. Accordingly, I am sending my check for \$20.00 with a copy of this letter to the Treasurer. I want it understood that I am doing this purely as a "holding action" to prevent termination by the Institute for the time being, and I expect you to notify them that I am, technically at least, in good standing. Then I expect to attend the next Chapter meeting and ask that a realistic and reasonable re-appraisal be given to the Chapter's finances. If this is done, I am willing to pay my fair share and will probably continue my membership. If not I am fortunate in believing that I will be able to transfer to the Washington-Metropolitan Chapter. Pearson, incidentally, is planning the same step. I only feel sorry for those members located in the center of the State to whom this course will not be open.

One last word as to what I believe the Chapter policy should be: the total budget requirements should be divided by the number of Corporate members and everyone should pay equally, with possibly some relief to the teaching profession. I do not believe that the benefits of Institute Membership are greater for any one member than for any other member. In any case, the larger offices generally have more Corporate and Associate members, and therefore, as offices, make a larger contribution.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE CHAPTER HEREBY ACKNOWLEDGES THE COMPLAINT WHICH YOU PRESENTED FOR JOSEPH H. SAUNDERS, JR., ON OCTOBER 27 REBARDING HIS BELIEF THAT ASSESSMENT OF ANNUAL CHAPTER DUES IS EXCESSIVE AND UNJUSTIFIED.

IT WOULD APPEAR THAT MR. SAUNDERS DOES NOT PROTEST THE "METHOD OF DETERMINING THE DUES TO BE PAID" BECAUSE HE PAID DUES FOR THE VEARS THAT THIS SYSTEM HAS BEEN IN EFFECT. HE HAS RAISED HIS VOICE IN PROTEST ONLY AFTER THE "RATE" WAS RAISED, AND HE WAS SUSPENDED FOR NON-PAYMENT OF HIS 1959 DUES.

Yours of April 10 at hand with enclosures pertaining to correspondence with Mr. Joseph H. Saunders, AlA, relative to his dues; also copy of your dues notice.

I don't know that I could be of any great value in resolving this discussion inasmuch as it appears a matter that should be properly solved within the chapter; however, Mr. Saunders' complaint seems to be based on his disagreement with the present dues structure of the chapter, and the interpretation placed upon it by the chapter.

I looked over the dues structure as explained in "exhibit D as finally approved and changed on the floor"--all of which appears to be very clear to me, and which presumably was properly approved by the chapter as applying to all members without exception.

It appears that the chapter is in the position of either exempting Mr. Saunders from requirements of your present dues structure, or taking the same action as would apply to any other member that did not pay his dues.



Dear Fleming:

Upon my return from vacation I received another letter from the Chapter Secretary notifying me of impending termination of Institute Membership for "non-payment of dues". Again I would challenge this, since I have paid the basic dues, only the amount of the supplemental dues (if any) is in question, and the Chapter is therefore violating its own "no questions asked" policy.

When Charlie Pearson and I attended the meeting at Skyland in May, we hoped to bring this matter to a conclusion, since this was the first meeting in the new fiscal year. We did not wish to continue in what we consider to be a most unfair and inequitable situation.

The Executive Committee agreed to a study committee on this matter, but the Chapter membership voted down a motion to instruct the committee to review the dues structure. Under these circumstances. Charlie and I had already decided on an immediate request for transfer, until you personally asked us to do nothing further until the committee reported in October. I told you that, if the Committee brought in a reasonable solution, I would then clear up the back account and go forward from there. If not, it was still my intention to clear up the back account and withdraw from the Chapter. because of your personal request did we proceed to "do nothing" that is, neither to request transfer nor to clear up the Virginia Chapter Account, bearing in mind that I still considered myself to be technically in good standing by virtue of having paid the basic dues. While we were "doing nothing" the Chapter Secretary, on June 26. proceeded to request the Institute to terminate my membership, without notice of any kind to me.

On July 21 I was in the process of writing you a letter along the lines of this one, when you phoned that you were withdrawing the request to the Institute. Again you asked me to defer any action, and again the Secretary subsequently sent the notice referred to in the first paragraph above.

It would seem that the Chapter now gives me no alternative but to go ahead with the action I planned last May. Accordingly, I am requesting transfer to the Washington-Metropolitan chapter. As I

have said from the beginning, I have never intended to dodge any legitimate obligation, unfair though I think it might be. I have carefully examined my books for the years involved, and find that the full accounting would be as follows:

1959 Basic dues 20.	
Supplemental: 10 employees @ 10. 100.	
Total for 1959	120.
1960 Basic dues 40.	
Supplemental: 14 employees @ 20. 280.	
Total for 1960	320.

Less: Basic dues previously paid	60.

My check in the amount of \$380.00 is enclosed herewith.

There is one other related matter which has just come to my attention. Three of our employees have applied for membership to the Virginia Chapter: Walter Mitchell as Corporate and Donald Misner and Caldwell Dugan as Associate. Although we know that these men were all passed by the Membership Committee in May, and others passed at the same time were announced in the August Bulletin, none of these three have heard anything from the Chapter. I have now been given to understand by the Chapter Secretary that these applications have been held up because of their relationship to me. If this is true, I consider this action to be most reprehensible and indicating vindictiveness on the part of the Chapter officers. This would only strengthen my desire to dis-associate myself with the Chapter.



J. H. Saunders Jr. Dies; Architect Of Alexandria

Joseph H. Saunders Jr., 71, an Alexandria architect who designed the T.C. Williams High School, the Tulloch Memorial Gymnasium at George Washington Junior High and numerous other public and private buildings during a career of almost 40 years, died Sept. 12 at Alexandria Hospital. He had pancreatitis and heart ailments.

Mr. Saunders, a member of the American Institute of Architects, established a practice in architecture and engineering in Alexandria in 1942

He continued it until 1980, when he retired and his firm, Saunders, Cheng and Appleton, was sold.

Over the years he designed several firehouses in Alexandria, St. Clement's Episcopal Church, and Alexandria Hospital, where he later was a member of the board of directors.

Active in civic and service organizations, he was a past president of the Virginia Jaycees, the Alexandria Chamber of Commerce and the Alexandria Rotary Club. He was a past national vice president of the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce.

He also was chairman of the architecture and construction committee of the Metropolitan Washington Board of Trade and the Alexandria Board of Architectural Review. He was a member of the Alexandria Advisory Committee for Community Improvement and the Alexandria advisory tax committee and the building code advisory board

In addition, Mr. Saunders was a former senior warden at Christ Episcopal Church and a member of the Belie Haven Country Club.

Mr. Saunders was born in Richmond and raised in Newport News. He graduated from Virginia Polytechnic Institute with a degree in engineering and from Harvard University with a degree in architecture.

Survivors include his wife, Gladys Crawford Saunders of Alexandria; two children, Joseph H. III of Lorton, and Anne Henderson of Shaker Heights, Ohio; two sisters, Elizabeth Greenman and Jane McMurran, and one brother, Robert Saunders, all of Newport News, and three grandchildren.
