

During the FAAIA's 61st Annual Convention to be held October 2 - 5, at the Orlando Hyatt House, a new President will take over.

Central Florida architect Nils Schweizer dies at 62

They called him the dean of Orlando architecture. For more than 30 years, Nils Schweizer influenced architectural design in Central Flor-

Schweizer, 62, died Friday after a short illness.
Those who knew him say he was more than a designer of large buildings. His commitment to his environment, community and church earned him a reputation as a humanitarian.

"He was a very modest, loving man who employed good people around him," said Lowell Lot-speich, 53, an architect who worked in Schweizer's offices during the 1970s. "He would let them be free to express themselves under his umbrella."

Schweizer was greatly influenced by Frank Lloyd Wright, with whom he studied architecture in the prestigious, Taliesin

Fellowship program. He also studied at the University of Georgia in 1943 and in Zurich in 1947.

He helped design Florida Southen College in Lakeland, Orlando International Airport, Epcot Center's Mexican pavilion, Loch Haven Park and St. Luke Episcopal Cathedral in downtown Orlando. In 1964 he helped build the Loch Haven Art Center, and in 1985 his firm designed the addition to the Orlando

Schweizer Public Library.

Schweizer came to Central Floration as ida in 1953 from Baltimore to work as the Southeastern representative for Wright's firm and to people oversee the design of Florida ell Lot-Southern. During that time, he ct who met his future wife, Beverly, who ces durwas an elementary education stuet them

When he was president of the Lakeland Little Theatre, he designed the sets. "We were both in the plays," said Mrs. Schweizer.

"He had a lot of energy. He worked long and hard and went out of his way for people and projects."

In 1960, Schweizer moved with his wife to Orlando and co-founded the architectural firm of Schweizer Associates with his younger brother Mark. His youngest brother, Hans, joined the firm several years later.

The firm has been responsible for the design of more that 100 buildings in Central Florida. Like the avant-garde Wright, Schweizer's designs placed emphasis on the environment and were tailored to serve human needs.

"He loved the people part about architecture more than the bricks and stones," said Lotspeich.

"He was professed in the organic approach to arbitecture, which is very sight-sensitive," said his son Kevin, 29, an architect with Integrated Design Group in Sanford. Kevin established Integrated Design with his brother Garth, 30, a landscape architect, and his sister Tamara, 25, an interior design-

Schweizer was a former chairman of the Florida Hospital Foundation, and a former member of the Loch Haven Park Board. He

was a past president of the Loch Haven Art Center and was a trustee of Florida Defenders of the Environment, a statewide organization that has worked to protect the state's environment. He also helped organize Kairos Inc., a national prison ministry group.

He was president of the Mid-Florida Chapter of the Florida Association of the American Institute of Architects in 1986. His wife said her husband built their home and indirectly influenced three of his five children to work as professional designers.

"He created a physical and mental atmosphere for his family," she said. "He certainly had great spiritual values that were a part of him. These were reflected in his relationships with his family, work and church."

Schweizer is also survived by son David, daughter Kyra and four grandchildren.

Funeral services will begin at 1 p.m. Tuesday at the Episcopal Church of the Good Shepherd, 331 Lake Ave., Maitland.
