Any architect living in the United States or in its territories or possessions, whether or not a citizen of the United States, may be admitted to membership in The American Institute of Architects if he satisfies its Board of Directors that he has adequate professional qualifications, an honorable standing in his profession and community, and is able to undertake the pecuniary obligations of the membership.

An applicant for membership must be vouched for by two members of The Institute who must sign his application as proposers.

A member, by virtue of his membership in The Institute, becomes a member of the chapter of The Institute within the territory of which he resides or has his place of business, as he elects, but he pays an admission fee to The Institute only. The admission fee to membership in The Institute normally is twenty-five dollars. (For 1936 this fee was reduced to five dollars.)

A member pays annual dues both to The Institute and to the chapter. The annual dues to The Institute normally are twenty-five dollars (for 1936 Institute dues were reduced to twenty dollars) and those to the chapter are fixed in its by-laws.

Normally the period between the time of filing

# AN ACT

To amend sections ten, eleven, and thirteen of the act, approved the twelfth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen (Pamphlet Laws, nine hundred thirty-three), entitled "An act to regulate the practice of architecture in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania by providing for the examination and registration of architects by a State Board of Examiners; defining the power and duties of said board of examiners; and providing penalties for the violation of this act," fixing the fee for renewal certificates, and extending the powers of the board as to revocation and suspension of certificates.

Section 1. Be it enacted, &c., That sections ten, eleven, and thirteen of the act, approved the twelfth day of July, one thousand nine hundred and nineteen (Pamphlet Laws, nine hundred thirty-three), entitled "An act to regulate the practice of architecture in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania by providing for the examination and registration of architects by a State Board of Examiners; defining the power and duties of said board of examiners; and providing penalties for the violation of this act," are hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 10. Each architect receiving a certificate of qualification under the provisions of this act shall, annually in the month of June during the time such holder shall desire to continue the practice of architecture as a registered architect in this State, apply for a renewal of said certificate, whereupon the said board shall, upon the payment of a fee of four dollars, issue to such architect, in such form as the said board may provide, a renewal of said certificate for the term of one year, and such renewal shall be duly registered by the secretary of said board in the official register of the board hereinbefore provided for.

In the event that any holder of a certificate of qualification to practice architecture shall neglect or fail to have said certificate renewed in the manner herein provided during the month of June in each and every year, the right of such architect to practice as a registered architect in this State shall cease and determine on the last day of the month of June during which said certificate should have been renewed under the provisions of this act, and it shall be the duty of the secretary of the said State Board of Examiners of Architects to give notice in writing of the expiration of such certificate to the holder thereof, and make a proper entry on said register showing the expiration of such certificates.

Any holder of a certificate of qualification to practice architecture which has [been suspended] expired under the provisions of this [act] section may obtain a renewal of such certificate, at any time within one year from the date of its expiration, upon application to and the approval of the State Board of Examiners of Architects, and, upon obtaining such approval and receiving such

certificate, shall pay to the secretary of the board a fee of ten dollars. The time of renewal may be extended at the discretion of the board of examiners.

Section 11. The said State Board of Examiners of Architects may, by unanimous action, revoke *or suspend* any certificate of qualification to practice architecture, issued or renewed under the provisions of this act, for incompetency or recklessness or for neglect of duty in the practice of architecture or for dishonest practice on the part of the holder thereof.

The board may suspend a certificate to practice architecture in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania of any architect who uses, displays or advertises his name jointly as "architects" with the name of any other person not legally engaged in the practice of architecture: Provided, That nothing herein contained shall be construed as preventing or prohibiting any architect holding a certificate of said board from using, displaying or advertising his or her name with the name of any other person or persons not an architect if each uses, displays or advertises his true appellation.

Any architect holding a certificate of said Board of Examiners of Architects against whom any of the foregoing charges may be preferred shall be furnished by the said board with a copy of the charges, and shall be entitled to a hearing before the said board, at which witnesses may be examined respecting the guilt or innocence of the person accused.

In the event that the holder of a certificate of qualification to practice architecture issued by the board shall be convicted in any court of competent jurisdiction in this or any other state or commonwealth of forgery, embezzlement, obtaining money under false pretenses, extortion, criminal conspiracy to defraud, or other like offense or offenses, and a duly certified or exemplified copy of the record in such proceedings shall be filed with the board, the board shall revoke or suspend forthwith the registration to practice architecture which it before issued to the registrant so convicted.

In the event that [said] a certificate is revoked or suspended by said board, the secretary shall make proper entry and registration of the fact of said revocation, and shall give notice in writing of such revocation to the holder of said certificate.

At any time after the expiration of six months from the date of revocation of said certificate, and upon the payment of all costs incurred by said board, the person whose certificate has been revoked may make application to the said Board of Examiners of Architects for a new certificate, and the said board, upon receiving evidence which in its opinion would warrant the granting of a new certificate, may, at its discretion, issue a new certificate upon the payment to its treasurer of a fee of ten dollars.

On and after July first, one thousand nine Acts hundred nineteen, it shall be unlawful for any person in the State of Pennsylvania to enter upon the practice of architecture in the State of Pennsylvania, or to hold himself or herself forth as an architect or as a "registered architect," or to use any word or any letters or figures indicating or intended to imply that the person using the same is a "registered architect," unless he or she has complied with the provisions of this act and is the holder of a certificate of qualification to practice architecture issued or renewed and registered under the provisions of this act.

This act shall not be construed to prevent persons other than architects from filing applications for building permits or obtaining such permits; nor shall it be construed to prevent such persons from designing buildings and supervising their construction, provided their drawings are signed by the authors with their true appellation as engineer or contractor or builder or carpenter, [or et cetera] but without the use in any form

of the title of architect.



- Schuylkill Falls, The Philadelphia Housing Authority -Typical Floor Plan



# OSKAR STONOROY, ARCHITECT, KILLED

City Planner and Sculptor Was on Reuther Plane

Oskar Stonoroy, architect, tity planner and sculptor who died Saturday night in the plane crash that also killed Walter P. Reuther, was the designer of the \$14-million United Auto Workers Family Education Center near Onaway, Mich., the destination of the plane's passengers. The center is to open

In July.

Mr. Stonorov also designed the headquarters building of the union in Detroit in the mid-1950's. A colleague said yesterday he was noted for integratsg sculpture with architectural

structure.

A partner in the Philadelphia firm of Stonorov & Haws, he angaged in public housing and city planning. In 1954, he was chosen by the Quakers as "the nost socially minded architect in Philadelphia" for the Fairount Avenue redevelopment in that city.

In 1932, he was architect for the \$1-million public-houseing aroject sponsored by the American Federation of Full-ashioned Hosiery Workers in Philadelphia He designed the Schuylkill Falls Houses in Germantown, Pa., in 1957, buildings for Temple University, and India's Pavilion at the New York World Fair in 1964.

Mr. Stonorov had worked on redevelopment plans for Newark's downtown district and for downtown Detroit. He designed smaller houses with large win-dow areas, outdoor patios and an open-floor plan and was an advocate of large kitchens.

He was born Dec. 2, 1905, in Frankfurt, Germany, and stud-ied at the University of Florence and the Ecole Polytechnique in Zurich, and with Aristide Maillol, the French sculptor. He came to the United States in 1929 and became a citizen in 1937.

Mr. Stonorov won a prize from the Fairmount Art Association for a sculptured fountain in 1965. He collected classic statues of Egypt, Greece and Mexico.

He was a director of the Philadelphia Housing Associa-Philadelphia Housing Association and Citizens Council on City Planning, and he was the author of "Le Corbusier: His Work," published in 1929, and, with L. I. Kahn, of "You and Your Neighborhood" (1945).

# OSKAR STONOROV

Moore College of Art Gallery 20th and Race Streets Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

June 14 to July 3, 1971 Opening June 14, 7 - 10 pm

Oskar Stonorov occupied a distinctive place in world architecture and was a decisive force in its development. Known chiefly for his social architecture of public housing and for trade unions, he contributed cosmopolitanism and reassurance to the architectural profession in America during the formative years of the modern movement here in the early 1930's. Upon coming to the United States. Stonorov did not locate in New York or attach himself to one of the universities, but moved almost immediately to Philadelphia, with whose architecture, planning and civic reforms he was actively and closely identified. During the last two decades of his life he resumed an early professional interest in sculpture, and spent an increasing amount of time in Italy, where he maintained a studio in Florence and worked chiefly on the design of fountains and other works of civic scale. Of the many significant themes in a career of prolific achievement, the most important seems to be Stonorov's continuous engagement with the social evolution, events. personalities and characteristic building types of his era. His was a career of architectural innovation rather than of stylistic refinement, open to the influence of events. In formal terms, Stonorov evolved from the rationalism of LeCorbusier's classical forms to the organic characteristics of Frank Lloyd Wright-and showed they were not so far apart as those architects and most of their contemporaries thought.

Oskar Stonorov was concerned, not just about buildings, but about entire cities. He gave expression to this concern in 1947 in his Better Philadelphia Exhibition. This great vision of a total city recast and renewed gave the initial impetus to Philadelphia's rebuilding and set the tone for much of what has happened since and what is still going on.

Oskar's concern for the dilapidated sections of the city and the people who live there led him into a series of projects combining physical renewal with social experiment. He was one of the first to see the potential in revitalizing what was already there rather than tearing it down. His Friends' Self Help project in East Poplar was one of the earliest urban redevelopment efforts to be based on rehabilitation and stands today as the forerunner of a major movement.

Oskar, before most others, saw that this work must be done shoulder to shoulder with the residents who would be affected. The document he prepared with Louis Kahn in 1944, "You and Your Neighborhood", is as fresh today as the day it was written. It establishes a recipe for a process that will take architecture out of the hothouse of professionalism and make it a life force in cites.
