By his conscientious and painstaking devotion to the design of his buildings, his sense of scale and understanding of the use of materials, he has contributed notably to the profession of architecture in Cleveland and vicinity as well as in Virginia and West Virginia.

His rare ability in design and his broad knowledge of architectural practice have contributed greatly to the prestige of the profession. As founder and senior partner in the firm of Small, Smith and Reeb since 1922 his practice covers a broad field in public, commercial and domestic architecture, distinguished for its dignity, simplicity and good planning. Outstanding qualities as a practitioner in adhering to the highest ideals of the profession, able administrator and clear thinker, and an inspiration to the younger men in his office, many of whom have since become prominent in the profession.

In Philip L. Small we have a happy combination of teacher and creator, administrator of the business and master of the complete artistic and technical duties of the architect. Possessor of a fine sense of proportion, an orderly mind, and a capacity for understanding the times in which we live, he has given to the many buildings he has designed a character which reflects the best in contemporary American culture.

He rendered valuable service in the preservation of buildings of historic and architectural merit in connection with a large building program for Washington and Lee University at Lexington, Virginia, and built with all the good taste of the period a new Law Building, Library and Dormitories on the campus. A future expansion program envisions a large Auditorium and Theatre, a new Science Building and extensive additions to the Gymnasium.

The development in Cleveland of the Shaker Square Shopping and Retail Center, with offices and restaurants, was one of the first attempts made for a harmonious grouping of a shopping center under one restricted ownership. For this project he was awarded the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce's Bronze Plaque for the best architectural group of commercial and retail buildings in Cleveland for the year 1929.

In the artistic design and handling of the Cleveland Play House, in 1927, he rendered a vital service in conceiving a basic scheme for two small theatres under one roof, which embodied the basic elements for many of the small community theatres that later were built throughout the country.

His early years of practice in the domestic field, when he executed many homes and estates with exquisite taste, setting the pace for many of his colleagues who followed his teachings, were but a forerunner of his subsequent wider practice in institutional, public and commercial work where his same painstaking devotion to design, details and good taste continue to prevail.


