General Information	Welcome to the AIA Design for Aging Review Awards, 17th Edition
	The AIA Design for Aging Knowledge Community is thrilled to invite architects, designers, and providers to submit projects for consideration in the <i>Design for Aging Review (DFAR)</i> , Cycle 17.
	The <i>Design for Aging Review</i> provides architects and their teams with the opportunity to demonstrate innovative solutions that improve the quality of life for older adults within specified project constraints. The competition includes a juried exhibition, access to digital content, and educational programs that showcase communities representing conscientious surroundings that advance environments for senior living. The jury is comprised of industry architects, allied professionals, and senior living providers, who will convene to select the recipients.
	All selected projects will be published in a digital DFAR17 compilation. In addition, the Merit projects will be published in a Supplement for Environments for Aging, sent to approximately 23,000 subscribers. The projects will also be exhibited at one of more of the following conferences: LeadingAge Annual Meeting

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and Expo, Environments for Aging Conference and Expo, as well as the AIA Conference on Architecture.

## Deadline and entry fees

- the deadline for submission is July 13, 2023 prior to 5pm

- all deadlines are strictly observed
- the **non-refundable** entry fee is \$750 for first entry (either built, unbuilt or affordable) and \$500 for additional project(s) or small project under \$3 million.

## Eligibility

All entries must meet the following requirements for each of the entry categories: (Note: No entity, neither owner nor architect, may submit a project if either party is a sponsor of any aspect or jury member of the *Design for Aging Review*, 17th Edition.)

- Open to AIA Members and non-members based in the United States or Internationally; however, there must be an identified US-licensed architect on the project
- Projects submitted by jury members or by the organizations they represent, and projects that included jury members on their team, will be disqualified.
- All entries must receive permission from owners and other team members and acknowledge that permission as part of the submission. Designers and providers should collaborate on completing the form, as there likely are some questions better answered by one group or the other.
- Projects may only be submitted once, under one category
  If a project can be classified under more than one
  category, applicants are encouraged to choose the one
  they think best applies to their project.

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# Submission Requirements

The DFAR submission requirements have been streamlined to no longer include Section III: Project Components, Size & Costs and Section IV: Resident Profile. Projects selected as recipients at all levels (Merit, Special Recognition, and Published) may be required to provide this additional information during a secondary process.

Please note the following:

<u>Built projects:</u> The built form(s) and related site work, whether it is an entire campus or a wing of a building, should be submitted for this category. Built projects that are submitted may include but are not limited to, the following suggested components:

- Active Adult/Age Restricted
- Independent Living
- Assisted Living
- Special Care Units (e.g. for persons with dementia, etc.)
- Skilled Nursing
- Other Medical Services Care Facility such as Hospice
- Senior Community Center/Adult Day Care Center
- Wellness Center/Fitness Center for seniors
- Other (e.g. Dining Facilities, Chapel, etc.) projects focused on seniors and aging
- All representative areas of the building components shall be submitted, including a site plan for the entire project, with all components clearly labeled. Jury evaluation will include a holistic overview of the complete project and the relationship of past, current, or future (if known) phases.
   For example, a LifePlan Community submittal that does not include the healthcare areas may be published but not considered eligible for an Award of Merit (see "Recognition").
- The function of the building and its major departments should be described in detail through site and floor plans, as applicable.



 Projects should be illustrated with color images of the interior and exterior of the building as well as perspective drawings, site and floor plans, elevations, and any other design elements deemed appropriate. Submissions must fully illustrate the interior environment as well as the exterior; at least one interior photograph must be included in the submission. Captions are required for all images, with north arrow and scales on all drawings.

Small Projects: Built or Unbuilt (\$3 million contrustion cost or less): This category includes supportive elements of the built environment, either as small stand-alone projects or as a part of larger projects, including interior and/or outdoor spaces. These special features may include, but are not limited to, aging-in-place; community-based projects; bathing areas; gardens; day lighting; acoustical, lighting, mechanical, and electrical systems; life/safety; dignity-enhancing; operating system designs; renovations or conversions of buildings for supportive housing; and innovative products that have been completed. Projects submitted in this category are eligible for a Merit Award.

Affordable Projects: Projects submitted to this category should meet the following criteria. Residents can obtain housing with a mix of income from 30-60% average median income (AMI) and should also meet Inclusionary Zoning needs. Housing types should be for independent senior and assisted living. Mixed income can include a mixture of affordable and market rate units within the project. Affordable projects are eligible for a Merit Award.

<u>Unbuilt Projects:</u> Projects submitted in this category may be in the planning phase only. Projects may be community or campus plans, master plans or re-positioning plans. Also, building projects that are currently in early stages of design, which demonstrate significant ideas or innovations, should be submitted in this category.



	Unbuilt projects should be illustrated with perspective drawings, site and floor plans, elevations, and any other design elements that are appropriate. If available, photographs of models (black/white or color) should be submitted. Captions are required for all images, with north arrow and scales on all drawings. Unbuilt projects are eligible for Special Recognition only.
